
Please keep in mind that each and every person is a member of Shinjuku City.

Winter Energy Conservation That Is Easy on the Family Budget

Let's Stop Wasting Energy!

During winter, when the sun is out for a shorter amount of time, energy consumption increases as we tend to use room lights and air conditioners more. Although you have probably done various things to save electricity since the earthquake on March 11, please check again to see how much electricity you are using. Energy conservation will also lead to lower utility fees.

Keep the Thermostat of the Afr Conditioner at 20°C

It is a good idea to set the thermostat of your air conditioner to 20°C. If you feel cold, think of creative ways to stay warm before you raise the thermostat, such as wearing a cardigan or using a lap-warmer or a hot water bottle. In addition, clean the filter of your heater regularly. By reducing clogging in your filter, you can lower the consumption of electric power.

Note: Please do not to try to bear with the cold to the point that it is unhealthy. Practice habits that you can continue to maintain for a long time.



Turn the Switch Off When You're Not Using Something

Electric appliances consume electricity simply by being plugged in. When you are not using appliances, it is a good idea to unplug them. It is also a good idea to turn off the main switches of TVs and personal computers to conserve energy, because these appliances consume electricity while they are in

standby mode. If you use an electric hot water pot, refrain from using the keep-warm function; boil water when you need it.



Three Energy Conservation Rules for Lights

There are three points to remember about saving energy on lighting, which consumes a lot of electricity. First of all, turn off lights as often as possible. Turn off room lights that are not in use. Secondly, clean the lighting fixtures. If lights and lampshades are covered with dust, this makes the lights less bright. Finally, it is a good idea to switch from white incandescent light bulbs to fluorescent light bulbs or LED light bulbs. Although these light bulbs initially seem more expensive, they consume less electricity and lead to energy conservation.

General Consultation concerning Families and Child-Raising

Consultants are available to think with you and offer advice concerning any worries or problems you may have concerning child-raising. They can also refer you to specialized institutions as necessary. Please feel free to call the special line for consultation (in Japanese only).

In addition, please call if you suspect child abuse in your neighborhood, for example, if you think, I'm worried about the neighboring family, there is something strange, or I can hear shouting, screaming, and crying. All information about callers will be kept strictly confidential.

Plaza-Style Temporary Child-Care

Child-care services are available for up to four hours at a time, regardless of the reason.

If you are temporarily unable to look after your child because of illness, hospitalization, nursing care, or other reasons, a nursery or cooperating family in Shinjuku City can provide child care. With one application, you can use this service for up to seven days.

HIV/AIDS and Sexually Transmit-ted Infections (STI) Are Immedi-

Shinjuku Public Health Center offers HIV and STI testing and consultation for free on an anonymous basis. Anyone can be infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) or have a sexually transmitted infection (STI). Because some STIs have no apparent symptoms, it is easy to infect your partner unknowingly.

Early detection and early treatment are extremely important in curing these illnesses, so it is a good idea to seek consultation and undergo testing if you suspect the slightest possibility of having these diseases.

1. HIV Consultation and Testing in Foreign Languages

Languages: English, Portuguese, Spanish, and Thai (1) HIV/AIDS Telephone Consultation, Tel: 03-3369-7110

Consultation Days: Thursdays, 1 to 5 p.m. (This service is offered in Thai twice a month, on days that HIV testing is conducted.)

(2) HIV and STI Testing

Testing Details: HIV and STI (syphilis and chlamydia) testing are given.

Please come directly to the site during reception hours to get tested. No reservations are necessary.

Testing Days: As a rule, testing is conducted two Thursdays a month. The schedule from January through March is as follows:

January 5 and 19, February 2 and 16, and March 1 and 15

Note: Please come again to the site a week after getting tested. The results will be given there. Reception Hours: 1:30 to 3 p.m.

The Registration System for Foreign Residents Will **Change Starting** from July 2012

- ★ The Alien Registration Act will be abolished, and residence records will be made for foreign residents in the same manner as for Japanese.
- ★ Those who are eligible for this system include foreign residents who will be staying in Japan legally for over three months (referred to as "medium- to long-term residents") as well as special permanent residents.
- ★ A copy of the provisional residence record (which will be an official residence record when the new system begins) will be mailed to those who are eligible from around May 2012, so please check and confirm its contents.
- ★ A residence card will be issued to medium- to long-term residents, and a special permanent resident certificate will be issued to special permanent residents. For more information, please call the Immigration Information Center (Tel: 03-5796-7112).
