

Have you noticed people riding small red bicycles around town lately? These bicycles are electricassist models used as part of a new bicycle-sharing service. If you register as a member, you can borrow bicycles anytime at any cycle port in Shinjuku, Chiyoda, Chuo, Minato and Koto cities. Shinjuku City plans to have cycle ports in twenty or more locations by March 31, 2017. Please take advantage of this service!

How to Use This Service

Step 1 Membership Registration

You can register easily and at any time via computer or your mobile phone. Apply on the bicycle-sharing website.

Step 2 Borrow a Bicycle

There are two ways of borrowing a bicycle. You can register your IC card or input a passcode that is issued each time you use the service.

Press the "Start" button on the bicycle's panel, and then either touch your IC card to the panel or input the passcode you received to unlock the bicycle.

Step 3 Parking Temporarily

Lock the back wheel of your bicycle manually after stopping. To resume riding, press the "Start" button, and then either use your IC card or the passcode to unlock it again.

Step 4 Return the Bicycle

You can return your bicycle at any cycle port, and then simply lock the bike and press the "Enter" button.

Frequently Asked Question

Q: I'm worried that I won't be able to pay my medical expenses if I become ill or injured.

A: Japan has a health insurance plan anyone can enroll in, such as National Health Insurance. Because everyone pays a designated amount of premiums, the fees you pay for medical treatment run between 10 and 30 percent of the entire cost.



Going to the Hospital

(1) Reception Desk

First Visit?

Show your health insurance card at the reception desk and tell them it is your first time to be examined there. Write down your symptoms on an interview sheet. The interview sheet will also ask such questions as what part of your body seems to be the problem, how long you've been having the problem, and your current condition. If you do not have a health insurance card, please show some form of identification, such as your passport or residence card.

Second or Subsequent Visit

Show your patient's card at the reception desk. If it is your first visit of the month to that hospital, show your health insurance card as well. (The hospital has to confirm that the information on your health insurance card has not changed since your last visit.)



(2) Wait to Be Called

Submit your interview sheet and sit in the waiting area until your name is called. (If you receive a number at the reception desk, wait until the number is called.)

Food and beverages are not allowed in the waiting area, and please avoid talking on your mobile phone or in a loud voice.

(3) Undergo an Examination

After your name or number is called, go to the examination room and talk with the doctor.

(4) Wait Until Your Bill Is Calculated

After your examination, please wait in the waiting area to find out how much you owe.



(5) Pay the Medical Fee

After your name or number is called, pay your medical fee. If you have a health insurance card, please pay the personally borne expense amount, which is between 10 and 30 percent of the total.

If you need medication, you will receive a prescription.

(6) Take Your Prescription to the Pharmacy



Go to a pharmacy—hospitals and clinics often recommend one close by-and submit your prescription. (In some cases, you can purchase your medicine inside the hospital.) If you have a health insurance card, submit it with your prescription and pay for your medicine.
