# The Rules for Everyday Utving &

At the park



#### Do not litter

Please throw your trash in a trash bin in the park, and do not throw away household garbage there.



## The use of fire is strictly prohibited

Campfires, playing with matches, and fireworks may cause a fire. DO NOT use fire in the park.

Are you familiar with the rules of common courtesy in everyday life in Japan, such as "Sort your recyclable resources/garbage according to type and dispose of them on the designated collection day," and "Be careful about making noise, such as loud voices and footsteps in the group housing"?

Even actions without malice can make other people feel uncomfortable and can develop into problems. In this issue, we describe some basic rules of common courtesy so that everyone can lead safe and worry-free lives.



### Smoking is prohibited

Smoking in the park is prohibited to prevent damage caused by cigarette smoke as well as the littering of cigarette butts. Smoking on the roads outside a park is also prohibited.

**Note:** Some parks have a designated smoking area.



#### Playing with a ball

Playing with a ball, such as playing catch or soccer, is prohibited outside of the sports corner. Please take turns using the sports corner, with fifteen minutes as a rough guideline.



Since bicycles are categorized as vehicles, you must obey the same traffic rules as car drivers.



## Five rules



Ride on the left side of the road.



Come to a complete stop at intersections; check left, right and backward for safety before proceeding.



Turn on your headlight at night.



Both adults and children should wear helmets while riding.



Riding a bicycle under the influence of alcohol is prohibited.

#### Parkyour bicycle in a bicycle parking lot

Leaving bicycles on a sidewalk or on the street is dangerous because they block the way for pedestrians. Please do not leave your bicycle unattended, even for a short period of time, and please use a bicycle parking lot.

#### The rules of common courtesy at public baths

1) Wash your body outside the bathtub. Get in the bath after washing your body clean of dirt and/or perspiration.



② Be careful not to splash any hot water or soap suds on anyone else.



③ Washing your clothes in the bathing area is prohibited.



4 Do not put your towel in the bathtub.



5 Do not raise your voice or cause a commotion.



6 Towel dry your body before returning to the dressing area.
