## 1 Hanazono-jinja Shrine



Various events take place throughout the year. The Tori no Ichi Festival in November is famous and draws crowds to pray for business success. And every Sunday, the Aozora Kotto-Ichi antique market features items like pottery and kimonos.

### 2 Omoide Yokocho



Located near the west exit of Shinjuku Station, Omoide Yokocho is a street with about sixty dining establishments.

A wide variety of foods await you there, including yakitori, motsuyaki (grilled tripe), and izakaya dishes.




### Three destinations and traditional culture


