Regasu Festival

Rules and Manners for Disposing of Garbage



There are rules for disposing of garbage. If you do so without following these rules, your garbage will not be collected. Please follow them to keep the city clean and comfortable for everyone.



Sorting

Sort garbage by type so that paper, glass bottles, plastic and other items can be recycled as resources.

Collection days

Put your garbage out by 8 a.m. on the designated collection day. Do not put anything out at night.

Collection locations

There are designated places to put out garbage. If you are not sure where they are, please ask someone in your neighborhood.

How to put it out

Put your garbage in a container with a lid (approx. 60 liters) or in a plastic bag that reveals the contents.

How to Separate and Dispose of Recyclable Resources/Garbage

Flyers and booklets that explain how to dispose of your garbage properly are available in multiple languages. They are distributed at city facilities and also available online.
